

This year is the tenth anniversary of 1/8 scale World Championship racing time does fly, it only seems like yesterday that the first World Championship event was held right here on this track, then called Thorpe Raceway. Now the track is part of the Ranch Pit Stop and there have been a great many improvements made since the old days.

The 1987 1/8 World Championships would see 80 drivers competing from abroad and 40 drivers competing from the U.S.A. It seemed that the earliest drivers to arrive all came from Singapore, Ermes Tadiello, David Quek and Randy Swan arrived three weeks in advance and spent all that time practicing. Almost everyone else came with four days to spare. The Serpent team all arrived with lightweight cars, this caused a stir as only Roem, Ton, Berovoets and Hippe were supplied leaving Losi, Keyes Baehr and Bueler out in the cold. There was some explaining to do.

During practice it was impossible to pick favourites. Normally here in the U.S.A. four minute heats are used for qualifying, but for this race the qualifying heats were ten minutes long, which meant that you had to run five minutes plus on one tank of fuel. Now that, these days is getting hard to do. especially wth 4wd cars, so during practice some cars were using carburettor restric-

There was a lot of motor testing taking place, the new S-Power being tried by the Serpent team, however they didn't race with it as they were still under contract with O.P.S. Mr Cesare Rossi was at the trackside complete with Piero Muio of O.P.S and Albert Picco of Picco motors. Our team, Associated were running 50/50 Mondial O.P.S. and Novarossi.

In all drivers from twenty one countries were taking part in the qualifying events, there were two rounds each day giving each driver six chances to do his best. At the start of qualifying traction was good and most drivers could not believe how long tyres were lasting. All qualifying heats were set up so that there was a mixture of nationalities in each heat. Finally the weather a little cool, low 70° to 80°, at least 20° down on the norm.

Wednesday

and the first driver to turn 35 laps was Ralph Burch Jr, he made a couple of mistakes so he knew he could go even faster. The next heat saw current World Champion Rody Roem turn an identical time of 35 -10.16.8. On his next round Ralph ran out of fuel leaving Rody T.Q. F.T.D. honours. Barry Grossenbacher U.S.A. was third and Tony Neisinger U.S.A. fourth. Top four drivers all go through into the A Final.

Thursday

The drivers rotas all swopped around now, that is drivers who ran in the morning yesterday run in the afternoon to day. Thursday really saw times start to improve Burch

timed 35-10.12.4 to take top spot and Gil Losi Jr turned 35-10.13.9 to take second. Gil had been struggling for a year to get the car just right, it seemed today he finally managed just that. A new starting system was used in qualifying for the first time in the U.S.A., with each cars time starting when they start

What this means is that as the countdown gets to three the cars may start and may continue to start until the first car away recrosses the line. This idea eliminates the first corner melee.

Losi and Roem knew exactly how to work this system to their best advantage, at the countdown Rody took off with an empty track in front of him, Gil waited until Rody was three quaters of a lap clear and then went, this allowed both of them to go very fast without getting in each others way. In the end Gil had just beaten Burch's time and turned 35-10.12.0 to take over top spot. Eventually qualifying finished and places looked like this.

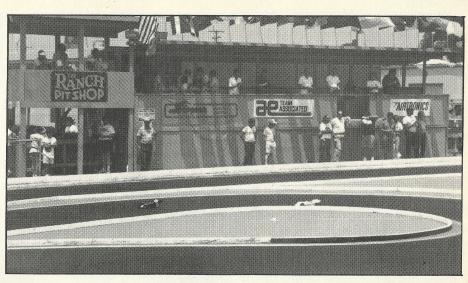

After the second pit stop Dana came out of the pits and was hit, knocking his silencer off. Barry was still flying a clear two laps ahead of Kloeber, eventually Barry was four laps ahead and finished by turning 100 laps.

Second Semi Main

Gary Kyes went straight into the lead from his number one position on the grid with Curtis Husting right behind him and Repete Fusco in third. After the first few laps Repete passed Curtis with Ron Rossetti in hot pursuit, by this time Repete was flying and passed Kyes who clipped a dot and lost a pin from the rear end of his car. The race ended with Repete winning from Rossetti in second and Curtis in third.

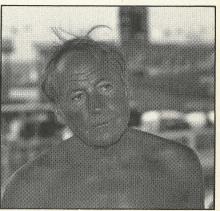
Final

Sunday was perfect, temperature was a steady 85° and the crowd was huge. The day started with a twenty minute practice session, finally the cars were called to the line for a Le Mans type start, the horn sounded and away they went. Gil Losi Jr took the lead followed by Ralph Butch Jr. Rody Roem, Barry Grossenbacher, Curtis Husting and Butch Kloeber.

Grossenbachers car was the fastest on the track but it didn't seem to have any brakes, he came up on Burch to fast and hit his rear tyre causing a crash that only Grossenbacher drove cleanly away from.

Five minutes and time for the first pit stop, Losi and Burch pull in together and Burch's pit stop is much faster allowing him away first but he lost the car and span into a wall, losing a wheel. So coming out of the pits it was Losi, Roem, Hustings and Grossenbacher.

By this time Grossenbacher in fourth place ran out of fuel and pulled out of the pits again behind Roem catching him at the start of the long straight. Losi started to run into problems now, first running out of fuel and his two speed locked in first gear for some time. By now the race order was Repete, Mercandante, Neisinger and Curtis with Losi challenging him for his fourth place. Time after time the two tangled for fourth place, the crowd loved it, but for Losi, all to no avail as thats how the race finished.
